Panel Title: Next-Gen Economies: Insights on Work, Technology and Institutional Reform in Lebanon and the Arab Region

## **Background**

As part of LAU's Economics Networking Event, this panel discussion will explore the future of work and evolving labor market trends in Lebanon and the broader Arab region. It brings together high-level experts from international and regional organizations to share insights on workforce readiness, public sector reform, technology integration, sustainable economic development, and progress toward the 2030 Agenda and the Sustainable Development Goals. Lebanon's labor market continues to face significant pressures—including economic contraction, high youth unemployment, talent emigration, and persistent mismatches between education and employment. These challenges are unfolding against broader transformations across the Arab region, driven by the Fourth Industrial Revolution, digitalization and the emergence of green and care economies. At the same time, fiscal instability and institutional fragility have reinforced the need for targeted reforms and regional cooperation. The panel will unpack these multidimensional shifts, drawing on lessons from Lebanon and regional and global experiences. Speakers will discuss how inclusive policymaking, strategic investment and innovation can help the region adapt to these trends while promoting shared prosperity, institutional resilience and long-term economic competitiveness. With a focus on Lebanon, the session will also explore public financial management and the state's role in creating enabling environments for recovery and reform. Finally, the session offers students and participants a unique opportunity to engage directly with thought leaders on the future of work and economic development.
